Karma, Anatta and Bad Faith: A Personification through Mona Lisa Smile

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Abstract: One of the things that interest me in Buddhism is the concept of karma. It takes on quite an oversimplified meaning since it has become a part of every individual's life. It may just be a term that we use in our day-to-day conversations but others attach a special affinity to it since they treat it as their guiding principle when it comes to their human relationships. Fascinatingly, it is the same term that is used by those who are heartbroken or feel betrayed by their special someone. It also serves as a reminder for anyone to think twice before doing something to others because that determines what kind of actions they would like to receive in the future. In spite of our common understanding of the concept, Buddhism shows that it is far more complex than we think.
