

DLSU hosts forum on violence against women and children

AS PART OF THE 18-DAY CAMPAIGN TO END VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND CHILDREN, THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS HOSTED the "Invisible Horrors: A Forum on Violence Against Women and Children" on November 27.

The forum was a venue for various researchers to present their studies on violence against women and children, in the context of the Philippine anti-illegal drugs campaign. It focused not on the anti-illegal drugs campaign, per se, but on its effects on those left behind, particularly the women and children. Five studies were presented:

1. Gender Relations in the EJK Household and Women's Empowerment by Baigani, which examined the power relations, social norms and structures that women are subjected to in pre- and post-extrajudicial killing household.
2. Anti-Narcotics Campaign and Poverty Reduction Programs by a group of independent researchers, which looked at the intersection of poverty and the anti-illegal drugs campaign, particularly on the beneficiaries of the Conditional Cash Transfer Program.
3. Pag Babae Lik-Tanaw: Reintegration of Women Incarcerated for Drug Offenses by NoBox Philippines that looks at the difficulties faced by women in reintegration with the self, family, and community.
4. Surviving the Present, Imagining the Future: Narratives of Children Left Behind by the Philippine "War on Drugs" by researchers from Ateneo de Manila University, Miriam College, and AKAP Diocese of Novaliches. This study tackled the orphaned children and how they make sense of the impact of the anti-illegal drugs campaign on their lives.
5. The Situation of Children during the Philippine War on Drugs by the Commission on Human Rights that looked into the cases of drug-related deaths involving children, which CHR handled.

The forum facilitated a meaningful discussion with the researchers and the audience, who came from the academe, civil society organizations, human rights groups, government agencies, and foreign missions.

The College hopes to facilitate several other discussions on this relevant and pressing issue, and seeks to find ways with various groups to provide help and support to those left behind.

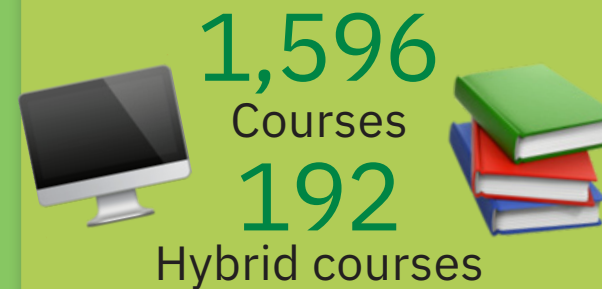

OUR COURSES



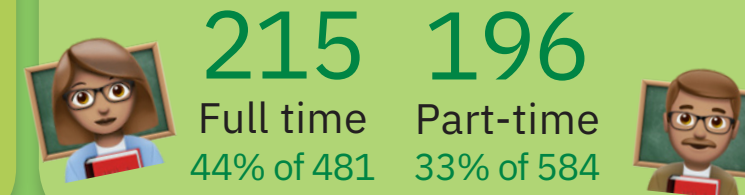
There are 1,596 active* courses online for Term 3 of AY 2018-2019. Among these, 192 of them are officially registered hybrid courses.

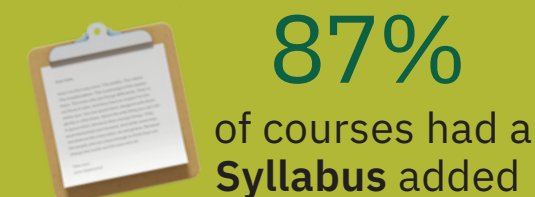
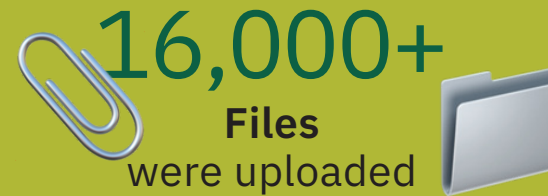

DLSU Safety Office Director Ronald Dabu, Associate Vice Chancellor for Campus Services Karen Hebron, and Dr. Jocelyn Dayanan attended the event.

The occasion marked SOPPI's 60th anniversary, which carried the theme "Sustaining Occupational Safety and Health Excellence," and brought together over 100 companies to learn from current best practices, unique programs, and outstanding incident cases from the country's top health and safety environment executives. It also served as a venue for networking by professionals and experts in the field.

SOE in Philippine Economics Society Confab

SCHOOL OF ECONOMICS (SOE) FACULTY, GRADUATE, AND UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS PRESENTED their latest scholarly work on challenges and opportunities for growth and development, and the central role that innovation plays in the fourth industrial revolution at the 57th Philippine Economics Society Annual Meeting and Conference last November 7.

The participants from DLSU led four sessions anchored on the conference's central theme of "Rethinking Development Strategies: Integrating technology, promoting competitiveness, reinvigorating industries."

"There is no doubt that the Philippines will undergo a technology - induced structural change. Understanding complex reactions brought about by the interaction between technological change and developmental outcomes would certainly require drastic strategies, lifelong learning initiatives, and policy foresight," said Dr. Lawrence Dacuycuy, Full Professor of Economics, former SOE dean, and president of the Philippine Economics Society as he declared the day-

long knowledge exchange among economists, researchers, industry and public sector top executives open.

The participation of SOE in this year's economics confab highlighted the inclusive research culture of the institution as shown by its vibrant array of research lines around pressing development issues and crucial opportunities in innovation and sustainability amid unprecedented changes brought about by the fourth industrial revolution.

"We are very proud of the breadth and depth of our research output showcased at the PES Conference this year. They represent our collective commitment to deliver unparalleled scholarship in economics to help solve real-world problems and contribute to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), financial and economic inclusion, sustainability, and to use innovative methods as a way to address evolving policy questions in the fourth industrial revolution," remarked Dr. Marites Tiongco, dean of the School of Economics, on the prominence of DLSU researchers in the annual economics conference.
