CSN2025: ADVANCING INNOVATION IN CONCRETE AND STRUCTURAL ENGINEERING

IN ITS CONTINUOUS PURSUIT OF INNOVATION AND EXCELLENCE IN CONCRETE ENGINEERING, the

De La Salle University Department of Civil Engineering hosted the 5th International Symposium on Concrete and Structures for the Next Generation (CSN 2025) last March 3-4.

The event was held in collaboration with the Japan Society of Civil Engineers and the Cross-Ministerial Strategic Innovation Promotion Program (SIP) by the Council for Science, Technology, and Innovation (CSTI) of the Japanese Government. CSN2025 builds on the legacy of the Ikeda-Otsuki Symposium (IOS2016), first held in Tokyo, Japan, in May 2016 to honor Dr. Shoji Ikeda and Dr. Nobuaki Otsuki, renowned figures in concrete engineering.

This year's symposium featured cutting-edge research presentations and keynote speeches by distinguished experts, including Dr. Jason Maximino Ongpeng of DLSU, Dr. Shinichi Miyazato of Kanazawa University, Japan, and Dr. Pitiwat Wattanachai of Chiang Mai University, Thailand.

Composed of researchers, industry professionals, and academics, the participants explored advancements in sustainable and resilient infrastructure, particularly the emerging trends in sustainable concrete



materials, advancements in durability, and strategies for structural resilience in an era of rapid environmental and technological change. Beyond the technical sessions, CSN2025 also served as a vital platform for networking and collaboration.

Additionally, the symposium was accredited for seven (7) Continuing Professional Development (CPD) units by the Professional Regulation Commission of the Philippines.

Since its inception, the symposium has traveled across Asia—Manila in 2017, Bangkok in 2018, and Kanazawa in 2019—continuing its mission to foster international collaboration and drive advancements in concrete technology.

SEMINAR UNVEILS CUTTING-EDGE SOLUTIONS FOR CONCRETE DURABILITY



CONCRETE CRACKING REMAINS A MAJOR CHALLENGE

IN CONSTRUCTION, affecting structural integrity and longevity. To address this, a Crack Seminar organized by the DLSU Department of Civil Engineering, in partnership with the Japan Concrete Institute (JCI), was held last March 5 at the Br. Andrew Gonzalez Hall.

This seminar brought together experts to discuss the latest advancements in crack investigation, repair, and strengthening.

A key focus was the JCI's Practical Guidelines for Investigation and Repair of Cracked Concrete Structures, a globally recognized resource since 1980. The latest 2009 edition continues to guide engineers in diagnosing and addressing cracks effectively.

Invited resource speakers from the JCl discussed the chapters of this guideline, including Dr. Kei-Chi Imamoto, Dr. Keiyu Kawaai,

Dr. Shinichi Miyazato, and Dr. Takahiro Nishida. For his part, Dr. Rodolfo Mendoza Jr. discussed some case studies on structural engineering in the Philippines.

The seminar featured interactive discussions, case studies, and expert demonstrations, covering early detection techniques, advanced strengthening solutions, and innovative repair technologies. These advancements are shaping more sustainable and resilient infrastructure.

While concrete cracks are inevitable, their impact can be managed and prevented with the right knowledge and innovations. This seminar was accredited for three (3) Continuing Professional Development (CPD) units by the Professional Regulation Commission of the Philippines.

Santos Creative Writing Center (BNSCWC) of De La Salle University, in partnership with the Roxas City Government, KRITIKA13 covered various arts and cultural practices, including literary studies, diaspora studies, visual culture, urban studies, performance studies, indigenous studies, children's literature, disability studies, art history and queer screen cultures.

The workshop gathered established art critics and talented young scholars to

tackle artistic and cultural texts through an interdisciplinary approach.

Dr. Rolando B. Tolentino, cultural studies scholar and BNSCWC Associate for Criticism, served as the workshop director. Dr. Carlos M. Piocos III, Chair of the Department of Literature and BNSCWC Associate for Poetry and Literary Studies, was workshop deputy director. The panel of experts included Dr. Isidoro Cruz, Lisa Ito-Tapang, Dr. Ronald Baytan, Dr. Jazmin Llana, Dr. Anne Frances Sangil, Dr. Jose Kervin Cesar Calabias, and Dr. John Iremil Teodoro (Director, BNSCWC).



UC Berkeley launches Br. Andrew Gonzalez Lecture

Philippine Studies Program at the Howard
Room, Faculty Club last March 20.

The lecture was delivered by Professor Caroline S. Hau from the Center for Southeast Asian Studies, Kyoto University, Japan.

Br. Bernie delivered the introduction about Br. Andrew, who earned his PhD in Linguistics at UC Berkeley. "To know and work with Br. Andrew Gonzalez at close quarters was to discover the full life of a great scholar, a Christian Brother, and, in the words of his dissertation supervisor, a "once in a century" Filipino who emphasized the need to grow a global network of academics, with members working together and appreciating each other for all their shared values as well as differences."

He shared about Br. Andrew's impact on the field of linguistics, for which he would receive



the title of Academician from the National Academy of Science and Technology. He pioneered the study of Philippine English and he pushed for the use of the Filipino language in all domains, even the most scientific and technical, and for the preservation of regional languages.

A well-respected, visionary school administrator and academic leader, Br. Andrew supported the development of various fields of study, invested in research, and promoted life-long education, especially for the faculty. He also pursued low-key advocacies, among them supporting hundreds of students from poor families until they graduated and helping put up a free hospital in his community in Apalit, Pampanga. At one point, he served as Secretary of Education.

For the lecture, Prof. Hau tackled José Rizal's novels Noli me tángere (1887) and El filibusterismo (1891), noting that "the novels' openness to multiple interpretations accounts for their longevity and storied afterlives and highlights the fragility of projects aimed at making community, especially the national one—a lesson that is all the more relevant in the contemporary era, even in so-called "developed" countries."

Br. Bernie acknowledged the support of the Philippine Consulate in San Francisco and the diplomacy initiative spearheaded by Philippine Senator Loren Legarda for the inaugural lecture.

CHAMPION TEAM AT ASEAN COMPETITION

A BSMS INDUSTRIAL ENGINEERING STUDENT FROM DE LA SALLE UNIVERSITY, TOGETHER WITH HIS TEAMMATES FROM OTHER ASEAN-MEMBER

UNIVERSITIES, won first place at the ASEAN Future Innovators Challenge held on February 19-23, 2025 at the Asia Pacific University of Innovation and Technology (APU) in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Jeremy Gabriel Uy, who is also a research assistant at the DLSU Department of Industrial Engineering, was coached by Vice President for External Relations and Internationalization Prof. Dr. Anthony SF Chiu and Nelca Villarin.

In line with the theme, "Empowering ASEAN Youth: Leadership for a Sustainable Future," the program aimed to address challenges faced by Southeast Asian countries and advance the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Referencing the Southeast Asia Climate Outlook 2024 Survey Report, Uy and his group collectively identified climate change, particularly urban flooding as the pressing issue they wanted to address. They found that "over 60% of urban drainage canals in ASEAN cities are clogged with plastic waste and debris".

To combat this, the group came up with the Aqua-Sentinel Youth Force, a multi-sectoral, technology-powered solution to creating flood-resilient cities. The model involves the collaboration of government, academe, industry, and communities.

For the technology support, the team mentioned an Al-powered Smart Drainage System and a mobile app to alert communities in real-time.

The project, mainly aligned with SDG 13, is also anchored with SDGs 11, 6, 9 and 17.

Bernard Oca FSC in his welcome remarks paid tribute to the country's media practitioners, highlighting their important role in upholding truth for the pursuit of justice and peace, as well as for the development of a sustainable society. He cited their coverage on former President Duterte's war on drugs, which mirrored their courage and commitment to their work.

The 20th anniversary of the Lasallian Scholarum Awards coincides with the golden jubilee year of DLSU's University Charter. As a special treat for the occasion,



the LSA introduced a new category – The Outstanding Feature Film on Youth and Education.

In partnership with the DLSU Student Media Office, LSA also presented the Outstanding Media Personality Award to Patricia Evangelista, author of the New York Times bestselling book Some People Need Killing and former investigative reporter of Rappler.

Executive Director of the Second
Congressional Commission on Education
(EDCOM II) Dr. Mark Karol Yee shared in
his keynote address how valuable access
to information is, and highlighted the need
to confront uncomfortable realities and
unsettling narratives in the education sector.

He mentioned some of the highlights from the EDCOM II report, which tackled the learning crisis affecting the future of Filipino children. He also emphasized the moral imperative to reach policymakers and other sectors of society.

"We must amplify these voices and build a narrative of possibility, one that is grounded on truth. Our work must be a catalyst for change and a bridge between diagnosis and action scheme," he added.

The Board of Judges for this year's edition was composed of Komisyon sa Wikang Filipino Commissioner Dr. Arthur Casanova; National Youth Commission Executive Director Leah Villalon; University Fellow Dr. Clodualdo del Mundo, Jr.; Bato Balani Foundation Inc. Managing Director Natalie Christine Jorge; and DLSU faculty member Br. Richie Yap FSC.

Winners in the professional categories each received a sculpture especially designed and crafted by sculptor Toym De Leon Imao.

The Lasallian Scholarum Awards contracted an independent media-monitoring agency for the screening of youth and education news and feature stories and, for the new category on film, announced a call for entries in November last year.
